

REFLECTIONS: UMC TO RELEASE RULES ON GAYS AND MARRIAGE

A fter 44 years of debating sexuality issues, the United Methodist Church voted by a narrow margin on Wednesday to allow bishops to appoint a commission to re-evaluate rules on gay, lesbian and transgender clergy and marriage.

The 428-to-405 vote by the delegates to the church's quadrennial conference in Portland, Ore., was seen by many as a last-ditch effort to save the church from schism.

It was celebrated by L.G.B.T. Methodists and their supporters as a way to buy time and avoid church discipline against more than 100 clergy and clergy candidates who came out as gay in advance of the conference.

But it disappointed many conservatives who were exasperated that their church is still arguing over what they see as clear church teachings that prohibit openly gay and transgender clergy, and same-sex marriage. The church's Book of Discipline, its governing document, says that the "practice of homosexuality" is "incompatible with Christian teaching." During the debate on the convention floor, Marquice Hobbs, a young delegate from Texas, urged church members to "lay aside all the political jargon, take a stand," and "do not be afraid to break." But George Howard, the delegate from Ohio who proposed the measure, responded, "I am not afraid."

He said, "I believe that our leaders are ready, willing

and able to lead this church to discover a new way

forward for us all."

The United Methodist Church is the third-largest religious body in the United States, after the Roman Catholic Church and the Southern Baptist Convention, with about seven million members, including Hillary Clinton and George W. Bush. It has 12 million worldwide. Its membership ranges from theological liberals to conservative evangelicals.

While many mainline Protestant churches, like the Presbyterian Church USA and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, have moved to permit gay clergy and same-sex marriages, the Methodist church has remained opposed. That is mainly because it includes branches in Africa and Asia that are growing rapidly and are theologically conservative while the American branch has had declines.

The church's liberals had hoped that growing acceptance of gay people and gay marriage in the United States would provide momentum. But faced with likely rejection, they embraced a proposal to ask the church's Council of Bishops to find a way forward. The council is made up of all active and retired bishops from the church's 46 areas in the United States and 20 outside.

The bishops' council proposed that the conference defer all votes on sexuality measures; more than 100 such measures were sent to the 10-day meeting. The bishops proposed that they appoint a representative commission to undertake a "complete examination and possible revision of every paragraph in our Book of Discipline regarding human sexuality."



In the Spotlight



Rev. Rafael Garcia was appointed Pastor of the UMC of Hempstead in July 2013. His tenure here was marked by many

positive changes within the church, excellent teamwork, integrity, and a high regard and compassion for all. Below is the story of his journey as a minister, pastor, educator, husband and father:

Pastor Garcia began his career as a minister in 1990 when he was ordained; two years later, he was ordained elder and accepted as a full member of the NY Annual Conference.

In his first appointment as the Associate Pastor of San Pablo Church, he also served as the executive director of an immigration program. Five years later, he was appointed to the Summerfield Church in Port Chester, Westchester County, where he spent 14 years serving the parish in a bilingual setting. In 2009, he was asked to serve Wesley Church in Franklin Square, and four years later, he was appointed to Hemptead UMC to serve both the English and Spanish-speaking congregations.


In the beginning of his tenure at UMC of Hempstead, the church was facing a crisis

of leadership, which created a financial deficit, uncertainty about the direction of the church, and disappointment for how things had been handled at all levels.

"As I started to meet with leaders and other members of the congregation, and listened to their concerns, we began to realize the need to restructure our Council in order to regain some sense of direction in our ministry," said Rev. Garcia.

To this end, the administrative and ministry committees needed to meet regularly, not just to set goals and strategies but also to report to the Council about their activities and determine if these were helping to meet ministry objectives. The church office needed to become an important tool for all of this to happen. Two new part-time secretaries were hired, the newsletter began to circulate again, and the congregation began to learn of the activities, and events happening in the life of the church. The Website was improved and the use of social media (Facebook) was enhanced. One of the main goals in this stage was to balance the budget,

resulting in improved income and more control over the expenses. Better use of our facilities would help us to move in this direction. We not only

renogotiated better contracts with existing groups, we were also able

existing groups, we were also able to bring other nonprofits into the building, which increased revenues and helped to serve other populations in the community. "To me, this is another way of doing ministry.

But to be able to have and manage all these groups in our building, we had to improve our facilities and we did just that," said Rev. Garcia.

Another very important dimension of our ministry which demanded our immediate attention was the healing of relationships. The congregation needed to trust each other again and realize that the Hempstead ministry had to encompass the the work of all of us. In this process, his

task was to incorporate forgiveness, love, compassion, and generosity in a framework of thanksgiving in our interactions. Because no one is perfect, we needed to see each other with the eyes of God and be compassionate to each other. Only when one is healed, can one start contributing to the project of God. This is how the idea of the Hempstead Fellowship Brunch came to fruition; the Outreach Committee worked hard on this important ministry. In like manner, we re-ignited the Scholarship Committee after the confirmation of eight youth, which led

to a very successful fundraising event led by this committee. The Missions Committee also saw the need in our community, and was able to distribute \$13,000 from the Benevolence Fund to several local non-profit organizations. Other committees, such as Education, Evangelism, Worship, Religion and Race, and the UMW, have followed this trend of ministering on behalf of the church in a significant way. For his own part, Pastor was able to support a great number of individuals and families through the Discretionary Fund. Rev. Garcia believes that these ministries are relevant because of the way they have touched the lives of many people.

While all of the above was happening, the English and Spanish speaking congregations had begun to engage in conversations toward merging and becoming one church with a bilingual ministry. This was accomplished, and as of July 2014, the church became the UMC of Hempstead with a bilingual ministry.

While it was not well received by many members of the Hispanic congregation, as many left, the seven who remained asked Rev. Garcia to continue working with them.

With their diligence and hard work, the attendance to the Worship Service in Spanish improved to a present average of 25 people on Sunday.

Rev. Garcia married Madeline four years ago; she has a daughter, Camille, who in March celebrated her 20th birthday. He entered his marriage to Madeline with four children: Keven Noe, who will be 22 in August, Camilo Ernesto, who will be 18 in August, and his beautiful twins, Oscar Amin and Malcolm Javier, who will be 14 years old

Pastor's educational credits include earning a Bachelor's

degree in electronic engineering technology rom the DeVry Institute of Technology in NJ; he graduated in 1986 and continued his education at City College where he finished a Master's degree in 2004 in International Relations with a concentration on the democratic process of Latin America in the 1980s. He also received a Master's degree in Education in 2010 from City College (with a specialization in teaching English to those who spoke other languages.) Rev. Garcia's education, ordination and 25 years of ministry have been important components in his journey. He has been committed to justice with peace issues his entire

life, and is proud to have participated in demonstrations for peace in war times, better conditions for workers in demonstrations for justice, and a high sense of consciousness for our environment. Also, during these times of struggles in the Methodist denomination for the full inclusion of our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters, Rev. Garcia has been able to show solidarity with them as these brothers and sisters are trying to help transform the denomination into a beloved community. Loving, raising and caring for his children, along with his wife, has been and amazing experience, full of challenges and celebrations. "I would not change it for anything in the world," said Rev. Garcia. As for his three-year tenure with the UMC of Hempstead, Rev. Garcia has many wonderful memories and sentiments to carry in his heart. "I will never forget the love and care that many members of the Hempstead congregation have shared with me, my wife, and our children during these three years of ministry. For that, I am indebted for the rest of my life," said Rev. Garcia. "I have met amazing people who have left a mark in my life as a pastor and as a person. 3 For this opportunity, I am deeply thankful."


