"The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?" (Psalm 27:1)


Dear Sisters and Brothers,

### Winston Robinson





Iniston Robinson was born on the Island of Jamaica, West Indies. As a teenager, he relocated to America and lived in the Bronx, NY. During his young adult life, Winston had the opportunity to meet Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. several times, due to his father's involvement with the Civil Rights Movement. These interactions with Dr. King left a lasting impact on Winston, as the meaning and value that he took from Dr. King's work and mission became foundational pillars that positively steered his life's journey.

As an adult, Winston moved to West Hempstead, where he attended the United Methodist Church of Hempstead, and joined the membership in 1996. During his twentyplus years as a member, Winston served on many committees: Race and Religion, Social Concerns, Staff Pastor Parish Relations Committee; and as Council Chairperson, Lay leader, Head Usher of one of the Usher's teams; Scholarship Committee, as well as contributed to the construction of the Sunday School classrooms. He particularly enjoyed his role as one of the breakfast chefs for the United Methodist Men's monthly breakfast meetings, as well as one of the coordinators for the UMM of Hempstead's Annual Dinner Dance. Although Winston remains a man of conviction, faith and prayer, due to his current health challenges he is unable to regularly attend Sunday Worship, Bible Study Sessions and the UMM Saturday Prayer Services, but continues to pray for the unity and spiritual development of our congregation.

eon Williams was originally from Charleston,
South Carolina and relocated to Harlem, NY in 1955.
A previous officer of the NYCPD, he retired from his job
1985. Leon is the husband of Rev. Elizabeth L. Williams,
a retired United Methodist Pastor.

# Black History Month - Remembering Those Whose Gontributions Impacted the World

Pebruary marks Black History Month, a federally recognized, nationwide celebration that calls on all Americans to reflect on the significant roles that African-Americans have played in shaping US history.

The man behind the holiday, **Carter G. Woodson**, considered a pioneer in the study of African-American history, is given much of the credit for Black History Month.

The son of former slaves, Woodson spent his childhood working in coal mines and quarries. He received his education during the four-month term that was customary for black schools at the time.

At 19, having taught himself English fundamentals and arithmetic, Woodson entered high school, where he completed a four-year curriculum in two years. He went on to earn his

master's degree in history from the University of Chicago and later earned a doctorate from Harvard. Disturbed that history textbooks largely ignored America's black population, Woodson took on the challenge of writing black Americans into the nation's history. To do this, he established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. He also founded the group's widely respected publication, the Journal of Negro History.

In 1926, Woodson developed Negro History Week. He believed "the achievements of the Negro properly set forth will crown him as a factor in early human progress and a maker of modern civilization." In 1976, Negro History Week expanded into Black History Month. Woodson chose the second week of February for this celebration because it marks the birthdays of two men who greatly influenced the black American population:

Frederick Douglass, who escaped slavery and became an abolitionist and civil rights leader; though his birthdate isn't known, he celebrated it on February 14.

President Abraham Lincoln, who signed the Emancipation Proclamation, which abolished slavery in America's confederate states; born on February 12.

For his work, Woodson has been called the Father of Black History.


